Another index project by Deb Weigle is the Jerusalem Evangelical Lutheran Church Records of Columbiana, Ohio, dating 1869-1923. Carolyn Stepien has completed more indexing of Eells Funeral Home records. The years range from 1846 to 1942. Some listings could not be found in other sources. Donna Carroll has been making an index of marriages listed in Valley Echo, the East Palestine newspaper. Many marriages are listed in the newspapers which took place somewhere else. CCARC has received some wonderful donations to add to our collection (Lyddy Chamberlain's scrapbook, photo album with names and unnamed pictures; Highland Cemetery records and box of unnamed photos; East Palestine Memorial Library donated 44 vearbooks; 3 volumes of Salem Republican newspaper abstracts 1857-1874 by Dorothy Yakubek and always Bible records (just finished filing Carol W Bell's copied Bible Records plus individual donated Bible Records).

# Free Online Access to Digitally Archived Newspapers

My Heritage Library Edition (EBSCO)

This resource includes all the newspapers digitized in the Google Newspaper Archives. For Columbiana County articles, you would like using the Youngstown Vindicator and When you use Google Newspapers Archive, you are unable to do a search. On My Heritage Library Edition you are able to do a search. You click on the Newspapers category ( found on the right column of Categories). Then choose Ohio Newspapers. For best results use a keyword search using the Name and Publication place fields. Results can be refined by Publication title, year or place. Open an article by clicking on the picture of the newspaper page or the newspaper name and date. If your article can not be found, possibly you will find it on the previous or next page. To copy an article without the highlighted area. Do a new search using the issue date and scroll to the correct page.

For Columbiana County articles, you would like most likely find them in Mahoning Vindicator, Mahoning Valley Vindicator, Evening Vindicator, Youngstown Evening Vindicator, Sunday Vindicator, Youngstown Vindicator and Vindicator. If your people lived close to the Pennsylvania line, you might find articles in the Beaver Falls Tribune, Beaver Valley Times or Beaver County Times. # What do we find in a Common Pleas Journal?

One thing we noticed was cases marked with deceased, it might depict an estate or a petition to partition. There might not be a particular date, but the year would be there. How many people have a death date anywhere near legal in 1823, 1824 or 1826. Early death records began in 1867,so you can see this would benefit descendants looking for early dates. Below is all the records for the deceased Common Pleas Journal Five (5) recorded 1823 -1826. Our Common Pleas Journals cover 1808-1893. Many times these deaths might not be recorded in Probate. Come in and check out these records.

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

# The Sunlit Road

"As dew to the blooms, and bud to the bee, as scent to the rose, are these memories to me."

When East Liverpool was incorporated into a village in 1834 there was but one hearse in Lisbon, It was one that had been made in the shape of a coffin of days a century ago. This had a narrowed head section in the manner of the times. This was arranged as a sort of receptacle for the casket of simireceptacle for the casket of similar design. It was situated on cross bars and joined with long wooden springs. It was a vehicular that was drawn by one horse.

This old hearse had another unusual feature in that the driver's scat which really was a chair was situated one-third of the distance back from its front. In subsequent days horse-drawn hearses had their seats in the front of such vehicles and immediately behind the horses attached to them. Doubtless this initial hearse in Lisbon motivated by single horsepower was an outstanding departure in the development of the county seat when it was introduced to the people living in and about

For many years the town functioned as did all early communi-ties without a vehicle in which the bodies of the departed could be transported to the cemeteries in which they were to be interred. What ultimately became of this know. It may be that it was for a time exhibited in some museum or maintained by manufacturers of the automobiles which they turned out in their early days.

This old hearse was owned by Erasius E. Eells, who coming to the Columbiana county seat from New England, became a cabb maker. In this capacity he made coffins. In this latter departure he continued making all of the coffins that were used in Lisbon to 1866. The only exception were cer-tain metallic ones that were utilized in the long interim in which he was active in his varied activities in the county seat.

In all Mr. Eells had the record of 63 years of business life in Lisbon. In this interval of time he buried over 5,000 persons. In doing so, he personally drove over 50,000 miles, it was estimated. His record additionally stood out because of the fact that never was he behind time or missed a single cugagement.

## Promient Abolitionist.

In addition to those held in Lisbon he functioned in funerals as far away as Cleveland, Cadiz and Canton, this state, and New Castle, Pa. He also had the experience in his long-drawn burying career of interring three persons who were over 100 years of age when they succumbed. He himself lived eight months and five days more than 82 years of age. He passed away on April 18, 1892.

He, despite his years, was on abled to attend to his business lairs the day provious to his paring. He was a man of strong character, a personage who was kindly and gentle in disposition. He was long an elder in the United Presbyterian church. He was the treasurer of Columbiana county at the outset of the Civil Ward, his term being from 1859 to 1861. He succeeded B. F. Thompson in this office and was himself succeeded by Eli Sturgeon in the term from 1862 to 1863.

Mr. Eells also stood out in Columbiana county, it is recalled as a strong abolitionist indeed, he was one of the earliest noted as such in Eastern Ohlo. He was among those who was said to have been active for almost a quarter of a century before the Civil war In promulgating activities of the underground railway which resulted in the successful liberation of many escaping slaves who managed to reach this "roadway's" connections in the north.

During his long lifetime he was married four times. His first three wives passed away. He thus was the father of acveral children. Some of his descendents couldnued their residence in the county seat where they have been amo

its leading and active citizety.

John Eells was the first of the name to come to America on the third voyage of the Mayflower in 1628. His son, Samuel, was the first of the lamily born in America, A year after his birth, in 1649, he was taken back to England by he was taken back to England by his parents. There he became a lawyer. He, in 1661, returned to America. He became a major in the army that took part in King Phillip's war.

Family History
One of his descendants was Rev.
John Eella who was the first pastor of the Congregational church in New Cannan, Conn. Erastus E. Eells was the son of Nathansel Eells, who was the son of Jeremiah Eells. The latter came to Columblana county in 1817 and settled on a farm in Elk Run township He passed away in 1823. Erustus Eelts located in Liabon the following year lie was born in Ciapboard. Coun., on August ? 1808 He was apprenticed to Joseph Ledlie, a cabinct maker. He began business for himself in 1828.

He was followed in the same line of business by his son, Leonard Hanna Eells. It is possible that be was named for Dr. Leonard H.S. the father of Mark Hanna, who also long lived in Lisbon. His son Erastus E. Eelis, also continued in the same life work as his forbears. Other members of the family are said to have continued in the same departure. In earlier days this es-tablishment is said to have had the distinction of being the second old-est in the United States.

It is also related of the first Erastus E. Eells that on one occasion he received notification of the need of a coffin just three hours before the time set for the funeral 10 miles away. Yet he managed to trim it as was then the custom and drive to the designated place in time to meet the engagement. His mother was said to have been Elizabeth Hort, a daughter of Jestice Hoyt, a Baptist minister.





# Taken from the booklet: ONE HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY of The Founding of THE FIRST PRESBYTERRIAN CHURCH, Salem, Ohio

Of the first Charter Members, only Mrs. Rebecca Campbell, lived in town. On Nov 21st Hugh Stewart, James Wilson, and Nathaniel McCracken were elected as elders, and a little later Christian Bowman, and Terah Jones were added to the session. Rev. Valandingham continued to supply the church for one-fourth of his time for two years, afterwards he preached here one-third of his time, residing at New Lisbon until his death occured in Octobert 1839. The first child baptised in this church, was Miss Lizzie Wilson, of sainted memory.

The church as first constituted was represented in New Lisbon Presbytery. After the union of the old and new school parties, a new arrangement was made, by which the south part of the New Lisbon Presbytery was annexed to that of Steubenville, and the north part, and part of Trumbull, formed Mahoning Presbytery.

After the death of Rev. Valandingham, the congregation formed a union with the congregation at Canfield, and obtained the ministerial labors of Rev. Wm. McCombs, for one half of his time from Jan. 4th 1840.
