We are all glad 2020 is over, the challenges were many. It was a rough year for CCARC and we were hard hit! This year 2021 has been a slow recovery and we still have a long way to go. 

He is a veteran of the Civil War, has served two years as County Commissioner, 36 years on the St. Clair Township Board of Education, and is a charter member of Calcutta Grange. Page B. Myler, also a charter member of Calcutta Grange, is very active in Grange work, as is his brother, James Myler. The latter is a pottery caster by trade, having followed that occupation since 18-2. These gentlemen are all members of the County Grange (Pomona) and the Myler brothers belong to the State and National Grange, as well.

#### **Old Photographs**

From the book, *String Too short To Be Saved, Recollections of Summers on a New England Farm* (1979) by Donald Hall, Poet Laureate of the US.

From the top of the piano and bookcase, the rows of faces seemed to regard me as their survivor. Daguerreotypes, tinted photographs, yearbook groups in cap and gown, blurred Brownie snapshots, field-hockey teams, wedding portraits, silhouettes, pictures taken when the subject knew he was dying, Automatic Tak-Ur-Own-Pix, and the crayon drawings you can commission at county fairs for a dollar. There was even the old framed photograph of a favorite cat, a little out of focus and indistinguishable from any other cat. The whole air of the conglomerate past spoke out to me, even the school pictures of my mother and my aunts, which perpetuated a dead girlishness among old hair-dos. To be without a history is like being forgotten. My grandfather did not know the maiden names of either of his grandmothers. I thought that to be forgotten must be the worst fate of all.

#### Robert Martin's Petition for a road - Aug 1818

To the Honourable the Comifsioners of Columbiana County Ohio

We your Petitioners Do humbly pray that your Honour would appoint us a view on the Road leading from Robt Martins to Jacob Nefsleys old mill Dam on Big Yellow Creek & Vacate the Same & Grant us a public Road from Said Robt Martins Theough lands of Samuel Swearingan and the nearest & best way through Land of Jeremiah Hickman & Through lands of Jacob Nefsleys to the mouth of of Blockhouse Run on Big Yellow Creek & Said Creek to the old mill Dam aforesaid. And your petitioners as in Duty Bound Shall we pray.

# PHILANDER GASTON, 93, IS DEAD IN CLARK

Pioneer Resident of Columbi- officiate. Interment will be made in Clarkson cemetery. ana Answered Death Call Sunday Afternoon-Funeral Services Wednesday.

Pollowing a few days' illness of a complication of diseases. Philander Gaston, 93, pioneer resident of Columbiana county, died at 3:15 o'clock yesterday atternoon at his home in Clarkson.

Mr. Caston was born August 1, 1829 on a farm a short distance north of Gaston's Mills one of a family of of Gaston's Mills one of a tamily of eight children. In 1851 he was married to Lucinda Conkie, sister of Jefferson Conkle, of Middletown township. The couple removed to a farm in Greene county, Ind., where two children—Mrs. William H. Crawford of Williamsport and Mrs. Nancy Rowe—were born.

In 1854 his wife died and he returned to this county. Five years later he married Charity Moore, a sister of the late John W. Moore, S., of this city. He operated a grist and saw mill on Beaver Creek in St. Clair township for a number of years and

township for a number of years and also a four-horse delivery service, supplying feed to East Liverpool consumers.

Later Mr. Gaston conducted the Gaston House in Wellsville, later known as the Commercial House, but he got tired of this vocation and returned to his mills. Thirty years ago he purchased a home in Clarkson and

retired.

He leaves the following children:

Was your ancestor a postmaster? A postmaster was appointed by the Postmaster General or, if making more than \$1,000 a year by the President with consent of Congress. U.S. Citizenship was usually required. Prior to 1971, the postmaster was required to live in the post office's delivery area. Women were eligible and were frequently appointed postmaster in small rural post offices. Postmasters served a little as a few months or more than thirty years. The control of the post office sometimes was a family affair. Multiple generations of one family serving as postmaster for the same post office. The National Archives has postmaster lists microfilmed. Carolyn Stepien has started indexing this collection, Appointments of U.S. Postmaster, Columbiana County. The years cover 1832-1971. CCARC has copies of all those years.


Recently CCARC received the complete book, FRANCIS E. SHAW AND RELATIVES WITH OTHER MATTER, by Francis E Shaw. Surnames with chapters: Shaw, Skelton, Hormell, Miller, Behner, Messimore, and Freed. Many gems may be found in this book, like the following:

Not long after Jacob Smith, sr. entered his section, he laid out New Alexander, on the southeast corner of his land, which was named for Alexander Campbell. (See p. 220). It was surveyed and platted by William Hall in 1808.

Five houses west of the highway leading from this village to North Georgetown (in early days called the New Road) and north of the State Road stood the John Ritz tavern (see pp. 308-309) built prior to 1811, which had a suffed black bear, standing on its hind feet, on the left side by the door for a sign. As late as 1818, a small sign board was yet at the door with a black bear painted on one end. This building was constructed of large hewed white oak logs. When the building was torn down, to make room for a more modern house, in July, 1916. after the weatherboarding had been taken off, the building had the appearance of having had a square front as high

as the ridge\* and as wide as the front of the building. Between the two up-stair windows, the upper half of one log and the lower half of the log above it was cut away -leaving a long opening as for a window or mow-hole.

On the right, as it appeared in 1914; and the James Estep building, to the left. The door now on the south, near the corner of the building was formerly on the east, south of the small tree. It was changed by James Cole after he married James Rix's widow. The State Road, leading west through New Chambersburg, lies south of these buildings,

We believe there had been a long window there, before the house was re-modeled. This was the first house in the village, and was built by Ritz, nobody now knows
