## 1950 United States Federal Census

Ancestry has the 1950 United States Federal Census for researching. Thanks to their proprietary handwriting recognition technology, all 1950 US Census records are now searchable.

Transcription accuracy is dependent upon the quality of the document being scanned. When I looked up my mother, her name was Hozel, not Hazel. I simply added the corrected information.

**Always view the Image.**

The 1950 US Federal Census began Apr 1, 1950 and lasted just four weeks. Every effort was made to ensure every American was included in the Census. Extra training was given to the Census Taker.

The following is a poem about the early **Census Taker**:

### CENSUS TAKER

It was the first day of census, and all through the land;  
The pollster was ready ... a black book in hand.  
He mounted his horse for a long dusty ride;  
His book and some quills were tucked close by his side.

just received a donation of the *History of Delaware County, Ohio*. Three people were found with connections to Columbiana County, Ohio. Just in the short bio you find clues of dates and various places. For their full bio's look them up on the pages listed.

**Nicholas S. Sampsell**, physician and surgeon, was born in New Lisbon, Columbiana County, Ohio 1 Apr 1818, son of Paul Sampsell. At the age of 18, he commenced the study of medicine under Dr. D. S. Silver, of the leading physicians of Columbiana County, Ohio, remaining in his office for three years. He was taken in as a partner and continued the practice of medicine in Columbiana until 1843, when he moved to Ft Wayne. He married in Columbiana County, Ohio to Mary A Rotzel. **Pg 645**

**J. A. Peasley**, farmer and teacher, was born 22 Apr 1836 in Morrow County, Ohio. His father, C Peasley, native of Addison County, Vt. With his father, Joseph. His mother's maiden name was Margaret Ashton, born in Columbiana County, Ohio. **Pg 716**

**William Pettit**, milling, was a son of William and Mary A (Rhineer) Pettit. His father was born in Ohio. He was thrown out on his own efforts by his father's early death. At the age of 26 he began working at carpentering with Moses Kale, of Salem, Columbiana County, Ohio. He married in 1861 to Mary J, daughter of George and Catharine Richmond. Her parents were from New Jersey. **Pg 795**

He was the son of James and Jane (Kerr) Gilson. James Gilson, son of Richard and Martha Gilson, was born in Madison Township 12 Jan 1814. Jane Kerr was the daughter of William and Eleanor (Clark) Kerr. William Kerr was born in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, coming to Columbiana County, Ohio with his parents as a boy. To James and Jane Gilson were born six sons and three daughters. Hon. John Gilson was the eighth child in birth order. **Pg 753**

**William and Catherine Taggart's Children:** William was born near Beaver, Pennsylvania. Catherine was born in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. After their marriage they moved to Jefferson County, Ohio in Saline Township. They were parents of eleven children: Nancy, wife of Israel Travis, died near Salem, Ohio; Jane, wife of James Crawford of Columbiana County, Ohio; George, husband of Margaret Norris, and at time of death was resident of Oak Ridge, Columbiana County, Ohio; John was subject of article; Mary, widow of William Norris and resided in Salem, Columbiana County, Ohio and other children listed. **Pg 920**

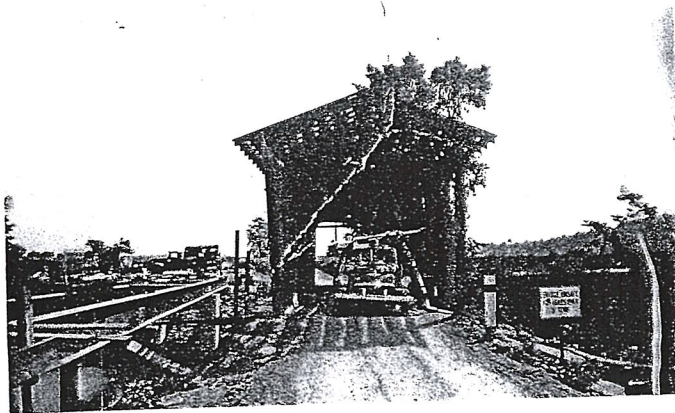

### 20<sup>th</sup> Century History of Steubenville and Jefferson County, Ohio and Representative Citizens by Joseph B Doyle

**Andrew A. Elliott, M.D.** was born in Columbiana County, Ohio 6 Oct 1853, son of John and Catherine (Adams) Elliott. His father was born in Scotland in 1818 and his mother was born in Ireland in 1824. The paternal grandfather brought his family to America at a very early date and settled first in Beaver County, Pennsylvania, later moving to Athens County, Ohio. From there John Elliott moved to Columbiana County, where he became a man of substance. Dr. Elliott entered upon the study of medicine in the office of Dr. J. W. Hammond of Wellsville, Ohio. He married Rachel Shaw, only daughter of James Gallagher 5 Sep 1883. Pg 616

With the opening of the new concrete bridge on the Gavers-Dungannon road, another old land mark of the horse and buggy days disappeared. A brief history of this land mark, known as the "Old Donaldson Covered Bridge," is told by Mrs. Lydia McKarns, of near Millport.

History of the old covered bridge known as the Donaldson bridge, so named from the Donaldson farm, located near New Lebanon United Presbyterian Church in Wayne Township, one mile west of Gavers.

The old covered bridge was built about 70 years ago, the contractors being Benjamin Crosser and Robert McClelland, and was built out of the best of material. A new concrete and steel bridge has been built and is now open for traffic, strong enough for today's heavy hauling.

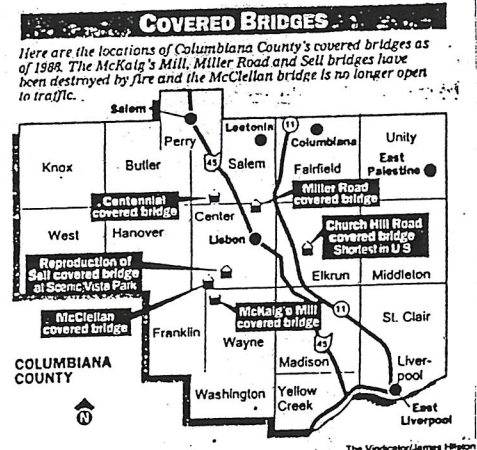
There have been three bridges erected across this stream, known as the West Fork of Beaver Creek, the first structure being built nearly 100 years ago, a light bridge for horse and rider only. One Sunday John Binsley and sister, Miss Mary, and a cousin, were returning home from Lebanon Church service on horseback, and while crossing the first bridge the floor gave way landing all three in the creek. Aside from a good wetting and bruises no one was badly injured. Then came the old covered bridge, built for horse and buggy traffic.

At the present time there are only three covered bridges open for highway traffic in the county.

\* \* \* \*

Mrs. McKarns, 91, is the oldest resident of Franklin Twp., and the only living person to use all three bridges. She crossed the new bridge a week ago, and crossed the first bridge many times as a young girl, when going to visit her grandfather Donaldson, for whose farm the bridge was named. James Thompson now owns the Donaldson farm, and is known as one of the largest potato growers in the county.

Mrs. McKarns was born on the Freeman farm, just west of Lisbon, and has always resided in this county. She is active and her memory is keen as she relates incidents of her girlhood days. Besides being a good historian, she raised a family of five boys and five girls, who, with the exception of one, are all living.

There has been confusion about the West Fork of Little Beaver Creek and all its branches since 1764 when Thomas Hutchins called the West Fork "Yellow Creek". It has been called "Cold Run" among others. Brush Creek in Wayne township is called "Big Creek" on the Topographical and General Highway maps of Columbiana county, and it gets confused with Brush Run in Madison township.)

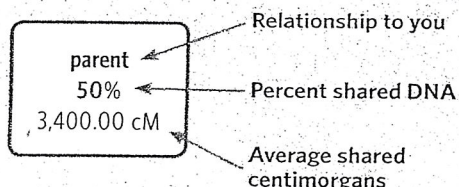

We have all seen the relationship charts. Family Tree Magazine had this one to show your relationship with your DNA results. Thought this might help with your DNA research.

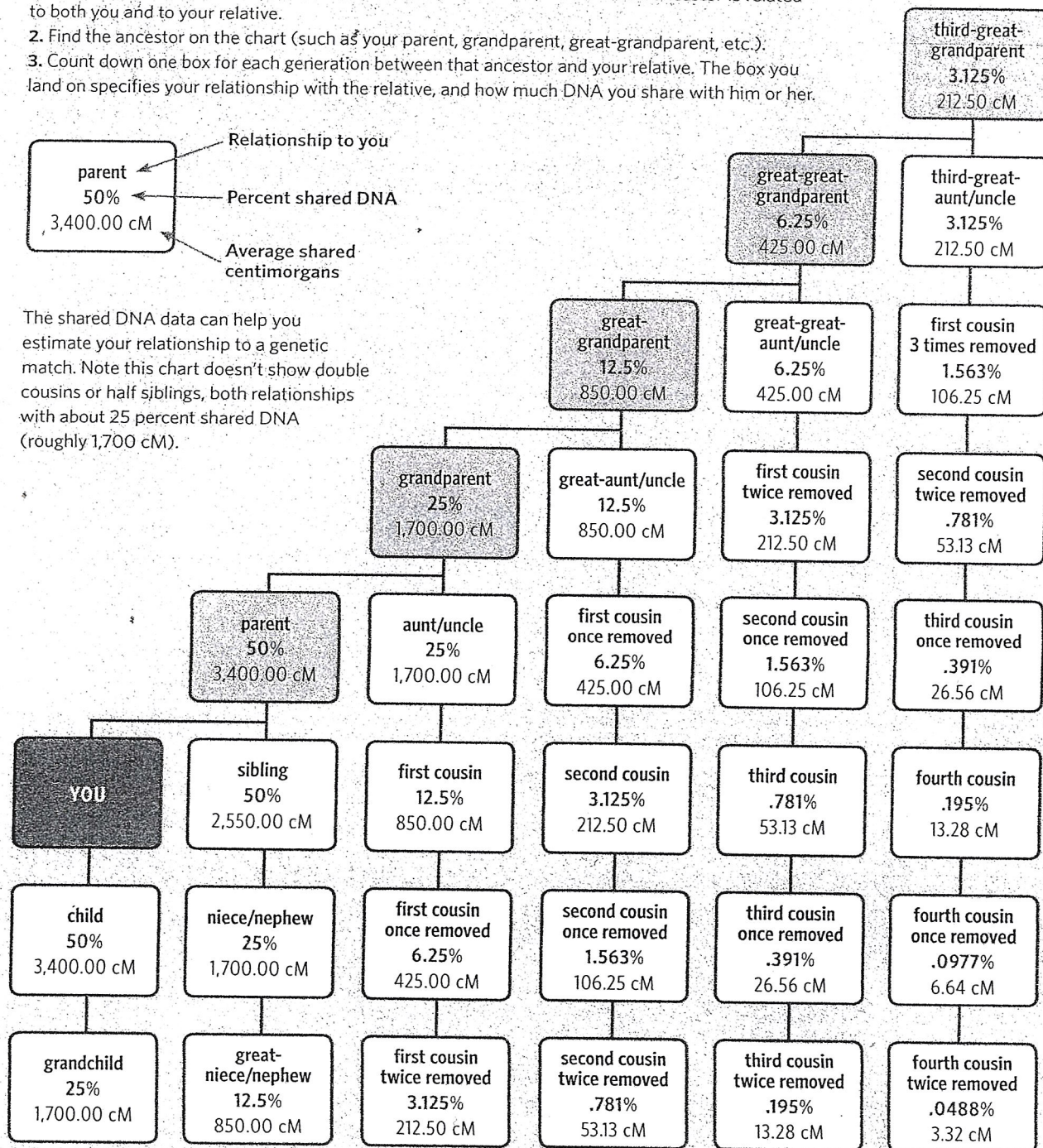
## How to Calculate Cousinhood

Follow these steps to figure out what kind of cousins you are with a relative:

1. Identify the most recent ancestor you share with your relative, and how that ancestor is related to both you and to your relative.
2. Find the ancestor on the chart (such as your parent, grandparent, great-grandparent, etc.).
3. Count down one box for each generation between that ancestor and your relative. The box you land on specifies your relationship with the relative, and how much DNA you share with him or her.



The shared DNA data can help you estimate your relationship to a genetic match. Note this chart doesn't show double cousins or half siblings, both relationships with about 25 percent shared DNA (roughly 1,700 cM).

10:20 o'clock, called to order by the president, who expressed his thankfulness for being able to be present and enjoy the day. An anthem, by the Glee club. Prayer, by Samuel Rhodes. Welcome address, by Prof. F. J. Roller, of Youngstown, who gave a hearty welcome to all, and stating that here we all could shake hands, and speak words of cheer, and for the time being leave the cares of life behind. Here the one with his pearly white locks, blooming for the grave, and the young with all the bright prospects before them, together they could spend a few hours; it is a copy of the final reunion in the world to come, if we are all faithful to duty, and closed by impressively saying "Whatever you do that is right, do it with all your might."

Response by Dr. W. C. Roller, of Holidaysburg, Pa., who expressed his thankfulness for the cordial welcome, and he referred to the integrity of the Rollers of the past, some of the different callings of life, and expressed a desire that we might meet frequently in these reunions.

Committee on officers, Samuel Rhodes, J. R. Roller, and J. L. Roller.

Adjourned for dinner. 2 o'clock p. m., called to order by music. Address by L. W. Hinlin, of Greenford, O., subject, "Reunions," showing the benefit we can derive by these meetings, if we will try and improve the few hours we spend together, and then be prepared for a final reunion.

Music by the Glee club, and an address by Rev. W. B. Roller, subject, "The Old Fireside," gave incidents of the fireside as it was 40 years ago. Followed by Levi Lehman, who spoke of the old fashioned splint broom. Also, remarks by J. S. Roller, who spoke of the old spinning wheel, by the fireside of the past.

Music by the glee club.

Committee on collections; reported \$10.28.

Committee on election reported, for President, J. B. Roller, of New Lisbon; Vice Presidents, Jacob Burly, of Tyrone, Pa., and A. L. Jones, of Alliance, O.; Secretary, Dr. J. H. Calvin, of Washingtonville, O.; Treasurer, W. E. Roller, of Washingtonville, O. Executive committee, Dr. W. C. Roller, of Holidaysburg, Pa., Dr. J. R. Hewitt, of Sharon, Pa., James Roller, of Williamsburg, Pa., J. L. Roller, of Washingtonville, O., and Dr. J. H. Calvin, of Washingtonville.

Genealogy committee of the Roller family, through Dr. J. R. Hewitt, reported the descendants of Philip Roller as follows: Number living at present, 358; number of deaths, 124; number of descendants, 482.

Time of next reunion, third Thursday of August, 1887, in the Sinking Valley, near Tyrone, Blair Co., Pa.

A locket containing a lock of hair of Caleb Roller; the locket supposed to be about 80 years old. Also, several pair of old fashioned clasps.
